Times to complete – Aprox 1½ hours

Dog Friendly Walk

Parking – plenty of on road parking

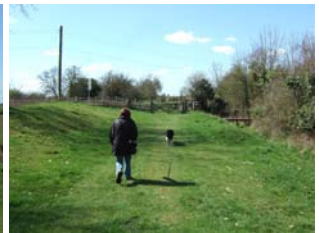
This walk starts at The Woolpack, a 16th century inn, which sits opposite the 13th century church of St. Matthew. The inn and the church are joined by an underground tunnel that in the past was used by smugglers.

As the village sits to the north of the Romney Marsh the walk can be very muddy at times especially during wet weather. This is a very easy walk with a few stiles to cross and very gentle slopes to climb.

Walk Number W2 - Warehorne



Enter the church yard and take the path immediately in front of you down the side of the church. Imagine a straight line right through the church bearing slightly left, this is roughly the route of the footpath. Follow this path and look for the stile to the left of the house. Turn right into road and cross railway track. This track being one of only two remaining diesel lines in the southeast.



Just before the bridge turn right onto the footpath that runs along the Royal Military Canal. Stay on this path until you come to a gate at the end.



Go through gate and turn right. Walk a short distance up the lane and look for footpath on your right. Take this path across the field heading towards the church in the distance. At next stile cross over and continue towards the church.

Walk Number W2 – Warehorne



Enter gate into church yard and turn right. Follow path and go through next gate leaving the church yard. Follow path keeping the fence on your right. Go through next gate.



Continue to next gate and cross the bridge. Head towards the left hand corner of the next field and look for gate in the hedge. Cross field and go through next gate. Continue to next gate and turn left. At junction with road turn right towards the Woolpack Inn.

Note: - Please follow the country code and ensure all gates are left closed and that dogs are kept on leads where farm animals are around.

When walking it is the walkers' responsibility to ensure they stay on public rights of way.
